Brokers Warn Employees Not To Spread Rumors

New York, Nov. 12. (P).—Members of the Stock Exchange and the Curb Market have issued written warnings to their employees declaring the circulation of rumors regarding the financial standing of any person, firm or corporation will result in instant dismissal.

This action was taken in an attempt to stamp out wild rumors that have been circulating through the financial district ever since the crash of the market.

Members explained that while brokerage houses employees are not held responsible for starting the stories, they intend to make certain the rumors are not passed on by their workers.

Last Night On the Air

Everyone who heard Al Tolson sing "Sonny Boy" felt a sting in his eyes and a lump in his throat. It wasn't the song so much, or Tolson so much, but just the idea of "Sonny Boy" dying, that made his pathos. Sunday morning about 10:30 while WTAM was broadcasting dance music a request came through for Ed McConnell to sing that song to a little boy out in the country who was critically ill.

Recognition last night was very satisfactory. While there was quite a bit of noise, the dial twister could have his choice of most of the stations on the air.

Radio Listeners Have Noticed, of course, that chimes are now used by the NBC as a cue for station identification.

"Ivory, apes and peacocks—spices, jewels, porcelains and silks—camel trains, strange seas and islands of the East, the land of Kubla Khan!" This is the setting of Donn Byrne's fa-tastic and fascinating story, "Messer Marco Polo," one of the finest creations of the poetic young Irish writer who died so tragically two years ago in a motor accident.

Frank Crumit's timely, topical, "Ticker Tape Song," will be one of the bright spots of the hour to be broadcast at 8 tonight by the Columbia chain. This is a new number never heard on the air before, and, as Frank said, is dedicated to "the Bulls who should have been Bears, and the Bears who should have been Bulls" when the stock

market began its toboggan slide a week or so ago.

"To market, to market, to buy us some shares. Home again, home again, chased by the Bears." The scene of tonight's broadcast will be laid in a Cuban cafe. It will contain, besides the vocal numbers, native dance melodies and serenades played by a guitar orchestra.

Dedicated to the cause of world peace and good will, mingling the music of ten nations, a gigantic international broadcast will go on the air for two hours on Thanksgiving Day.

Famous bands, orchestras, typical ensembles, and choruses of nine European countries, none of them ever on the air in America will be heard in this one program.

England is to be represented by His Majesty's Royal Air Force band, Scotland by the pipers of H. M. Scots Guards. France supplies the 80-piece crack band of the Gards Republicains, through special permission of the French government, never before granted for any form of reproduced performance.

Germany is represented by the National band selected from its famous regimental bands and by a mixed chorus singing typical German airs and students' songs. Austria by the famous Lanner quartet, which plays "Schrammel music" in the coffee houses and gay cafes of Vienna and by songs of the women who sell lavender flowers in the streets; Hungary by the Budapest Gypsy orchestra. Italy furnishes music by an orchestra of sixty drawn from La Scala opera in Milan and a Sicilian string orchestra from Palermo. Bavaria has a Swisslander orchestra of ten pieces, the quaintest of all. The program closes with American works played by John Philip Sousa, and his band, one of the most famous in America.
